Youth Opportunities Leadership Training for Local High School Students

Three local high school students traveled to Washington, D.C. in June where they represented United Power on the Electric Cooperative Youth Tour. The Youth Tour and upcoming Cooperative Youth Leadership Camp are opportunities for high school students to build relationships with other leaders among their peers and develop important leadership skills they can model in their communities and schools. It is also a great addition to any resume or college application.

Report an Outage 303-637-1350 Customer Service 303-637-1300 Rural Electric Cooperative Association's (NRECA) annual meeting in 1957. The keynote speaker, Senate Majority Leader Lyndon B. Johnson, suggested sending youth to the nation's capital to "see what the flag stands for and represents."

During the summer Youth Tour, cooperatives from across the country send more than 1,300 students to Washington. The week-long trip includes meetings with local elected officials in Congress and tours of historical monuments around the capital. Students also learn the value of the cooperatives they represent. This year, United Power sponsored three ambitious and exemplary high school students to participate on the Youth Tour – Zachary Lam, Skyline High School; Taryn Petruncola, Erie High School; and Arnav Sudheer, Prospect Ridge Academy.

Before departing for Washington, students from Colorado and Wyoming toured the State Capitol in Denver, watched a highvoltage safety demonstration at United Power's headquarters in Brighton, and heard presentations about cooperative career paths.

"This was a fantastic opportunity, and I am so grateful to United Power for providing it," said Sydney Dawson, one of United Power's representatives at the 2023 Youth Tour. "Being able to see the capital and meet all my representatives in Congress was a surreal experience. I would highly recommend it to anyone and everyone."

At the conclusion of Youth Tour, peers elect one student to represent their state on the Youth Leadership Council. The student selected as a delegate participates in the NRECA annual meeting the following March with other delegates from across the country. United Power Youth Tour representative Elizabeth Clement was selected as the Colorado delegate in 2022.

"I could not recommend this trip more because you get to see so many things in such a short amount of time and you learn so much," Clement said. "I did not even realize how much I was learning until the last day. I grew as a person on this trip."

Youth Leadership Camp

Students depart for the Cooperative Youth Leadership Camp in mid-July. While camp takes place in the mountains outside Steamboat Springs, it is not a camp in the traditional sense. There are cabins and catered meals instead of tents and campfires.

I recently attended a conference for cooperative CEOs and board directors. The keynote speaker asked a rhetorical question of the audience: "Why are you here?" An admonition we are all familiar with, often seen on raffle tickets, followed the question: "Must be present to win."

SCAN ME

Peach Crisp 4 1/2 lbs ripe peaches 11/4 cup light brown sugar 3 Tbsp tapioca starch 2 tsp vanilla paste or extract 1 cup whole wheat flour 10 Tbsp unsalted butter 3/4 cup rolled oats

For the filling: Score a small 'X' at the base of each peach and lower into a pot of boiling water. Boil peaches until skin begins to peel, about 1 minute. Transfer peaches to an ice bath. When cool enough to handle, peel peaches and slice into wedges. Whisk 3/4 cup brown sugar, tapioca starch, 1/2 tsp kosher salt, and vanilla in large bowl and add peaches. Toss to coat. Let stand 30 minutes.

For the topping: Pulse flour, 1/2 cup brown sugar, and 1/2 tsp kosher salt in food processor. Add oats and pecans. Pulse 2-3 times. Add butter and pulse until mixture resembles coarse meal.

Place peaches into 9x9" baking dish and sprinkle with topping. Bake at 350° until golden brown, about 1 hour and 15 minutes. Let cool and serve with ice cream (optional).

RECIPES

Safe Tree Trimming Observe the "10-Foot Rule" to Safely Trim Trees Near Power Lines

Were you aware tree limbs may become a safety hazard when in contact with power lines? Did you know attempting to trim a tree in contact with a power line puts you in danger of electrocution? Have you ever been uncertain about when and where to trim your trees located near power lines?

As trees grow over the years, they may come in contact with power lines, creating confusion about responsibility and concern about member safety. United Power wants to make sure you know the answers to your questions so you can safely tackle your summer yard work.

For quick reference about who is responsible for maintaining trees near power lines, please check the "Who is Responsible?" sidebar (*at right*).

When you see a tree in the vicinity of a primary power line, immediately contact United Power. Avoid trimming when you encounter the following: tree limbs in direct contact with a power line, dead tree limbs hanging near power lines, or tree limbs growing toward power lines. Observe the "10-Foot Rule" to safely trim trees on your property located near power lines. This means anything inside that radius may put you at risk. United Power will disconnect secondary lines when notified in advance of any tree trimming activity for your safety and at no cost to the member. Remember to trim only from a steady, level surface, removing small, easy to manage sections. If this is not possible, contact a professional tree trimmer. Large trees or branch sections may fall unexpectedly and risk taking down power lines and causing potential injury.

When in doubt about safety or responsibility, please contact United Power at 303-637-1300. We will send out a representative or one of our tree contractors to assess the situation and keep you safe.



Who is Responsible?

United Power has an aggressive tree trimming program to help reduce the number of treerelated outages. However, in some cases, the homeowner may be responsible for keeping a line to their home clear. Here is how it works:

- United Power is responsible for trimming around primary lines. These are lines running from pole to pole. United Power maintains these lines because they are higher voltage and require special handling from a qualified tree trimming crew.
- Members are responsible for obstructions in secondary lines. These are typically single lines stretching from our pole to a member's home — often seen in backyards, crossing from the main electric line to the home.

Summer Heat is Here

How to Control Your Usage and Keep Summer Bills Manageable

Colorado could experience an exceptionally hot summer this year. Scorching heat outside could have your air conditioner working overtime to keep you comfortable inside your home.

Your home's largest energy-user and most demand-intensive appliance is your air conditioner, accounting for more than 15% of your total annual energy use. This means that when you reach for your thermostat there will be a corresponding rise in your energy bill to accommodate the increased use. Practicing energy saving behaviors can keep you cool and also keep your costs lower. Here are some tips to help you save energy and money:

- Turn up the A/C a few degrees. A couple degrees can result in noticeable savings without making you uncomfortable.
- Pair A/C with a fan. Fans do not actually cool the air in your home. Instead, they displace warmer air and create a "wind chill" effect making you feel cooler.

Remember to turn fans off in empty rooms to save even more.

- Install a smart thermostat. Smart thermostats can learn your routines and be adjusted remotely to save energy. This makes it easier to preheat and precool your home while you are away so it is comfortable when you return without using excessive energy. Members can also enroll in Smart Rewards to earn an additional \$25 each cooling season, and may qualify for rebates on new Honeywell smart thermostat purchases. - Avoid Appliance Stacking. Using multiple major appliances at once, such as cooking while doing laundry, can drive up demand costs. Spread the use of your appliances over time to limit demand charges. More information about managing your demand can be found at www.unitedpower.com/demand.

FACT: United Power does NOT have any contracts to work with rooftop solar installers, and we do NOT sell solar products.




MYTH: THE LAW REQUIRES SOLAR
